

A message from the principal

Today I told a story at our Monday Morning Meeting about a couple of frogs who fell into a deep hole. The other frogs peered down into this very deep hole and decided it was impossible for them to jump their way out. They kept hollering down to forget it, it was just too deep to get out. One frog eventually gave up. The other frog fought on, jumping, grasping, and persistently trying to get out. He did! In the end he did the seemingly impossible. When the frogs at the top asked him why he didn't listen to them and just give up - the valiant frog told them he was hard of hearing and thought they were cheering him on and encouraging him. What a lesson! The value of encouragement in the face of what seems impossible can be the difference between success and failure.

At the IAA we strive to encourage all of our students and we strive to create an environment in which our students encourage each other. This week we had some beautiful examples of this; our 4th graders created a geodesic dome together that required hard, collaborative work. When it collapsed, the groups encouraged each other to solve the construction problems. We also had a group of 5th graders at Friday Town Meeting perform a beautiful dance they create. It was a dance that highlighted their unit on human rights and showcased some basic human rights they felt all people should have access to. The students needed to create together, and then needed to encourage each other during their very public performance. These are just two examples of how even a little encouragement makes a huge difference.

This helps us focus on our expression when we are reading. We use pictures, text clues, and what we already know to help us infer the character's feelings and how he/she might sound.

English Language Learners Integrate the Arts

Our many ELL students work hard every day with Ms. Aranka, Ms. Kristen and Ms. Mary, but they are also busy integrating the arts. Some of our goals are to increase vocabulary, learn new grammatical and sentence structures, and deepen our understanding of texts. Here are some examples of how the arts help us to do this. Students acted out new verbs using gestures and pantomime and then practiced using the words in both present and past tense. Students practiced new vocabulary and complex sentence structures playing the theater game, "This is not a paper towel tube. This is a ." Another group listened to the history of the Nashua River in the book A River Ran Wild and then created a dance depicting the various events during the river's history. Finally they wrote a multi-paragraph essay

pulmonary venous return. At first all those things were very confusing to me, but my mom showed me lots of diagrams to understand my sister's special heart.




REGISTER ONLINE today! Here's how...

- Step 1: Go to www.heart.org/jump or www.heart.org/hoops and click on Register Today.
- Step 2: Enter your **School Name** and **State** and click **Submit** to find your school's event. When you sfind your team, click the **Join Team** hyperlink.



- Step 3: Create your own Username and Password and answer a security question. Click **Continue**. (Be sure your Username and Password are easy to remember.
- Step 4: Fill out the registration form. Review the **Online Waiver** and click the box to accept it. Once you are done, click the **Continue** button.
- Step 5: A **Share With Your Friends** screen will pop up. Enter a message that you would like to share via social media and click on the program/s that you would like to use. Once you are done, click the **Publish** button. You'll see a confirmation screen and a button you can click to enter your HeadQuarters and set up your web page. Or, click the "X" in the upper right hand corner of the pop up box to skip this step.
- Step 6: Download the mobile app by searching for Jump/Hoops.

Art News



NOFA CHILDREN'S CONFERENCE





FOOD & TAXES


Save Money and Eat Well with EITC and 3SquaresVT. It's tax season again! Vermonters who made under \$52,427 in 2014 may qualify for the Earned Income Tax Credit (EITC), designed to boost the income of working families and worth up to \$6,143 as a tax credit or refund. Income guidelines are based on tax filing status and number of dependent children in the home. Families who receive the Vermont EITC are income eligible for 3SquaresVT food benefits, saving money not only on taxes, but also on grocery bills, with the average 3Squares benefit over \$200/month. Plus, children who get 3SquaresVT can also get free school meals. Dial 2-1-1 for information about free tax help services, to make an appointment with a certified tax preparer and to learn about 3SquaresVT and school meals. 
